Submission

What are the review criteria for the letter of intent (LOI)?

Two reviewers, one from an HCSRN and one from an OAICs site, will review each LOI application. In addition to the standard NIH criteria, review criteria will include:

- 1. Study relevance to older adults with MCCs;
- 2. Leveraging OAIC-related data and/or the unique features of the HCSRN and its data;
- 3. Likelihood that the project team will reflect a new collaboration between OAIC and HCSRN investigators; and
- 4. Likelihood that the proposed study will be completed within one year.

They will score each of the review criteria on a scale from 1 (exceptional) to 9 (poor). According to the combined score, a final determination will be made on whether an invitation will be sent for an applicant to submit a full Pilot Program Grant application.

If I receive an invitation to submit a full application, what will be the requirements?

Applications must be in NIH 398 format, and include the following components:

- 1. Face Page*
- 2. Abstract/Project Summary
- 3. Specific Aims (One Page)
- 4. Research Plan (Six-Page Limit; Does Not Include References or Human Subjects)
- 5. Human Subjects Section (If Applicable)
- 6. Biosketches for Key Personnel (New NIH format)
- 7. Detailed Budget Page*
- 8. Facilities & Administrative/Indirect Costs Checklist*
- 9. Budget Justification

Can a submission have multiple PIs, and if so does a multiple-PI form need to be submitted?

Yes, you can have a multiple-PI submission. If so, NIH does require a Multiple PI form; however, it can be brief.

The HCSRN-OAICs AGING Initiative is funded by the National Institute on Aging (NIA) grant R33-AG057806. The pilot funds will be awarded through a subcontract from the University of Massachusetts Medical School.

How will funds be distributed?

A subcontract will be issued to the primary site. It will be responsible for issuing a subcontract to the secondary site. Funds will not be distributed until IRB approval of the proposed project has been submitted to the AGING Initiative.

What indirect rate should be used?

The \$40,000 budget is for total costs, both direct and indirect. Applicants are advised to adhere to their respective institutional polices related to indirect cost rates associated with federal grant submissions.

Is the NIH salary cap applicable?

Yes, the NIH salary cap is applicable to the pilot grant applications. The federal salary cap must be applied to personnel whose salaries exceed the cap.

Investigative Roles

What defines an early stage investigator?

For this grant, an early stage or early career investigator will be defined as not having received a major grant from NIH, AHRQ or PCORI (R01 award or equivalent).

Do I need to have an investigator from the HCSRN-OAICs AGING Initiative on my research team?

No.

Do the HCSRN and OAIC investigators need to be co-Pls?

The application must include collaborating investigators from *both* an HCSRN research center and an OAIC, however they do not need to be co-Pls. The principal investigator on the application must be affiliated with either an HCSRN research center, an OAIC, or be a current or former AGING Initiative MCCs Scholar, but all other investigators on the research team may have other roles.

Are there specific requirements for what data are used?

No, pilot projects data may come from variety of sources including HCSRN VDW, OAIC, VA, publicly available data. Data can also be from non-US sources. However, using HCSRN VDW and/or OAIC related data is strongly encouraged.
